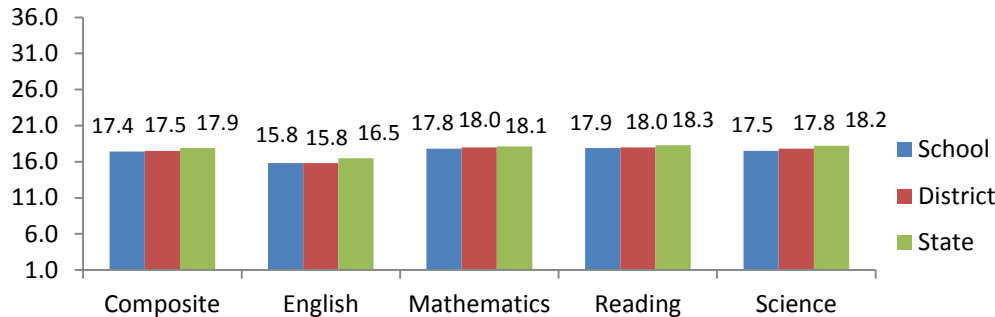

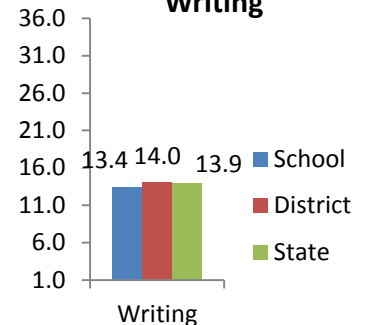
The Rock Hill High School faculty and staff continued to set high expectations for all students this year in academics, the arts, athletics, character, extra-curricular activities, and community involvement. This year we had 15 students graduate with highest honors, 20 with honors, and 97 received a gold seal diploma. One hundred and four students were CATE completers, and 15 seniors attempted to earn an IB diploma. Out of 445 graduating seniors, 263 earned LIFE and 15 earned Palmetto Fellows scholarships. The grand total of all scholarships offered to graduates was \$10.4 million dollars. In the arts, students performed in All State choral, orchestral, and band instrumental ensembles, and competed in Visual Arts and Drama showcases. The Band of Distinction placed in the top 5 in the state 4A marching band competition and received the SC Band Directors Association's Outstanding Performance Award for the 17th consecutive year. Our chorus was named the 4A State Champions at the SC Choral Festival, and 10 members were selected for the SC All-State Chorus. Our Drama Department received a Superior play rating at the SC Theatre Association High School play competition, and 2 Superior ratings at the Palmetto Dramatic Association/SC Thespian Festival. The Chamber Orchestra and the Concert Orchestra participated in the SCMEA Orchestra Division's 2015 Concert Festival, earning excellent ratings. The Visual Arts Department received 7 awards this year. An Honorable Mention and 3rd place were awarded at the York County High School Art Show Rock Hill High Athletics had 42 SCHSL Scholar Athletes. 16 individual athletes made state tournaments representing wrestling, tennis, swim, golf, and track, and 15 signed to play college sports. The wrestling team won the 4A Duel Wrestling State Championship for the second straight year and swim had an Individual State Champion. The baseball and wrestling teams were named Region Champions. We had 41 All-Region athletes, two region players of the year, and two region coaches of the year. RHHS had 10 All-State athletes representing swim, cross-country, tennis, and wrestling. All faculty and staff continued to focus on improving students' achievement on End of Course, ACT, and SAT testing and will continue to work with students to provide the best education possible. EOC scores improved in Biology, Algebra and History. Teacher professional development focused on the six shifts in the Common Core State Standards. The Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports program continued this year to improve school climate and character education at RHHS. By the end of the school year students had been recognized with 3438 Bearcats Bucks for showing Bearcat PRIDE (Participation, Respect, Integrity, Dedication, & Excellence). Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

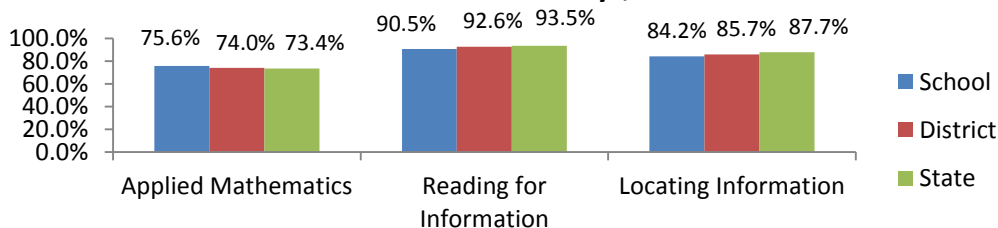

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
