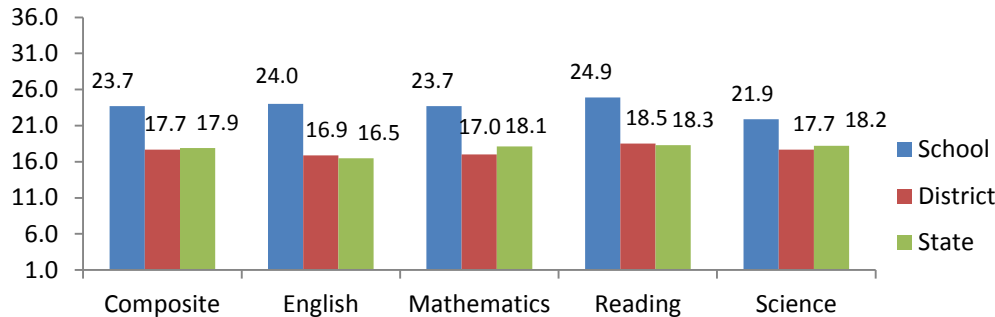

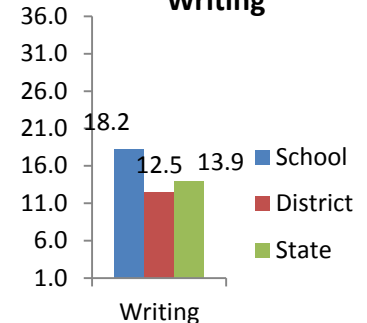
Palmetto Scholars Academy was founded in 2011 by a group of parents seeking a unique educational environment that would meet the needs of gifted students. This initiative led to a 6th – 8th grade charter school with a mission to provide a differentiated program designed to meet the educational needs of intellectually gifted learners, address their distinctive social and emotional needs, promote individual character development and instill a life-long love of learning. Likewise, the school desires to help our students to engage with leading innovative organizations in higher education, business, and science to empower them to make original and impactful contributions toward the elevation of South Carolina in the areas of education, commerce, arts, and science. Over the past 5 years, PSA has grown to be a full middle and high school serving 6th – 12th grades. It has established itself as one of the top schools in the state. A few of the highlights of our success include: •Receiving grades of A and 100 on federal and state assessments for the school •Showing an increase from 180 students to 350 students in 5 years •Establishing ourselves as state leaders in areas such as robotics, cyber-security, National History Day, Beta Club, and Odyssey of the Mind •Obtaining state and national recognition in the Student Spaceflight Experiments Program for having two teams chosen to send their experiments to the International Space Station. These successes have provided the foundation for an outstanding educational experience. From the middle school up, we integrate differentiated strategies to promote depth and complexity in our curriculum and provide opportunities for acceleration and enrichment across all disciplines. At the high school level, we are utilizing dual-enrollment courses with Trident Technical College and the College of Charleston, AP courses, and honors courses so that our students can create college preparatory pathways in STEM and Arts & Humanities as they prepare for careers in those areas. By integrating best practices for educating high ability students throughout our curriculum, our students are more efficiently equipped with critical, creative, and collaborative skills necessary for success in today's society. One of the most critical components of our enriched curriculum is the research program which culminates in a Capstone Experience. Starting with sixth grade, our students take a series of research courses which move from exploration of multiple careers to actual production of a research project in at least one discipline consisting of a research paper and a product which could include an oral presentation, a visual or multi-media display, or a type of service. Just as important as our academic focus, PSA intentionally focuses on meeting the social and emotional needs of our students. We seek to create a safe place for all students as they navigate the multiple challenges of adolescence. Our staff strives to create positive relationships with every student in the classroom, in extracurricular opportunities, and through our house system. The house system is modeled after the British house

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
