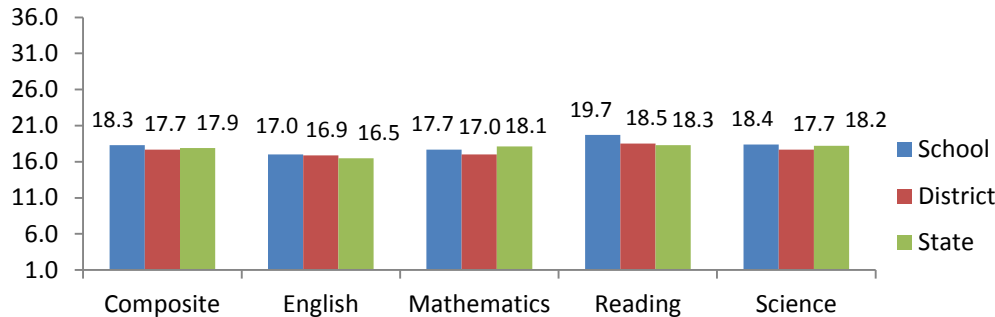
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

Coastal Leadership Academy went into its second year of operation with enrollment growth in all grade levels. We increased our student population by more than 39%. This year our school was fortunate to be able to add a new drama program as well as a Teacher Cadet program. These offerings allowed our students to branch out and try their talents in the areas of performing arts and education. We were very pleased to be able to offer unique combined US History and English classes. These students experienced Project-Based Learning across two disciplines as they tied their English lessons to relevant time periods in History. Our weekly community speaker series continued this year with experts who came to talk to our students about a wide range of topics such as banking, professional writing, international mission work, disaster relief, and equine therapy. We were very fortunate to be able to expand our facility by adding an additional 3000 sq ft. to our existing building. Our new space included a new classroom, three new offices, a tutoring center, and technology center complete with a Chroma key screen for students to use for videotaping. In January, our entire school was invited to take part in South Carolina's School Choice Rally on the Statehouse steps in Columbia. We traveled on buses to listen to Governor Haley speak about choices in education and joined in as others across the state supported school choice. We also took the opportunity to visit the statehouse and learn more about our state government. Staying true to our charter, our faculty worked to create our first schoolwide Project-Based Learning showcase. Second semester allowed us the opportunity to invite the community into our school to take part in our student led Renaissance Festival. Our school was also very thankful to be able to work with the Nathan Yon Education Foundation to be able to offer the first scholarship to Miss Brittany Wright. In memory of their son's love of education, Mr. and Mrs. Yon will be working with Coastal Leadership Academy to offer this scholarship on an annual basis. It was a very sad but proud day in April, when the student body lined the halls to see off Mr. Jeffrey Layton, one of our science teachers, as he marched off to active duty with the US Army. Thank you to Mr. Layton and all of our military men and women for serving our country! It has been a year of learning and growing and we are excited to begin year three as our Archers prepare to "Aim for Excellence" in 2015-2016.

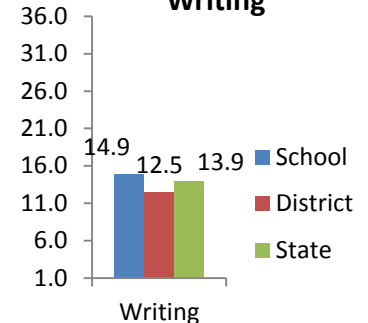

The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
