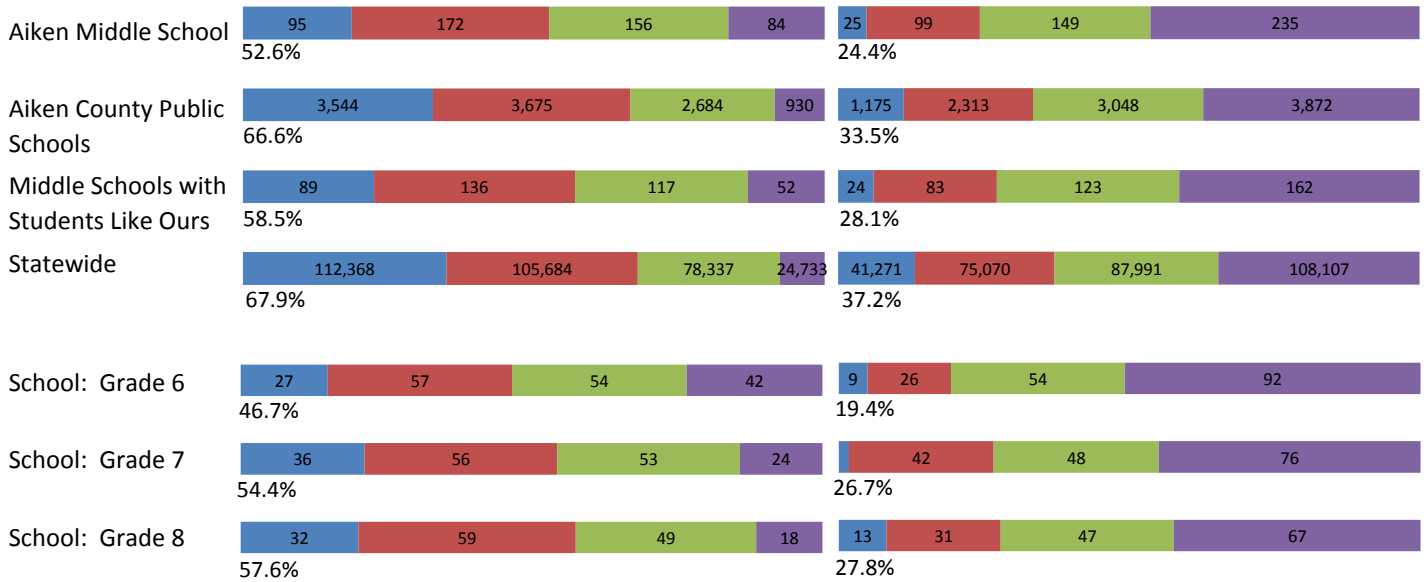
Aiken Middle School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by providing a safe, caring, and academically challenging learning environment. "Achievement, Motivation, Success" is our guiding principle. We demonstrate this by providing our students with constantly evolving and improving instructional methods and student recognition services. Our teachers are seeking to acquire and implement new methods of instruction through rigorous professional development and individualized instruction. Our teachers implement the use of technology in our classrooms and the school is striving to continue expanding our use of technology throughout the school experience. Our school entered a partnership allowing us to gather data and formulate a plan for overall school improvement. Success of this program was cited throughout the year and the relationship will continue during the upcoming school year. Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) were developed to allow teachers collaboration in planning for the implementation of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) educational opportunities and the use of formative assessment to better plan instruction to meet the needs of individual students. At Aiken Middle School we also have various programs outside the academic world to focus on the development of the whole child. School wide we have a focus on providing opportunities for students to work collaboratively with each other while learning valuable life skills for communication, conflict resolution, and empathy for (and acceptance) of others. This year we implemented the first steps of the Preventive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) program. This program recognizes our students for displaying positive behaviors. We will continue to grow our program with the goal of creating a more positive environment for all students. Our guidance counselor used the My Campus Committee (MCC) to provide an anti-bullying message to our students. The student focused group is designed to offer peer support for students in need and build confidence in our students to prevent bullying behaviors. We also continued our Buddy Program which pairs regular education and special education students to build relationships and understanding between diverse groups of students. Our school continued the partnership with a community organization to provide intensive counseling and mentoring opportunities to many of our At-Risk students. 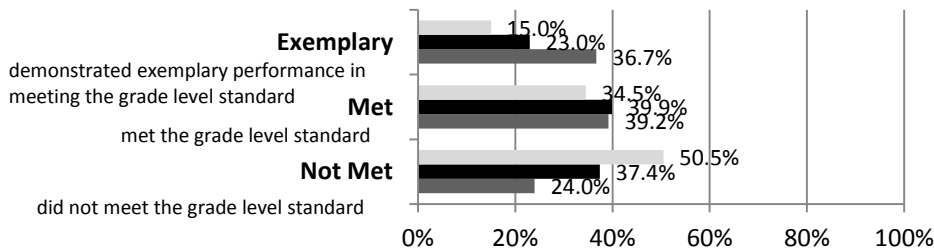
