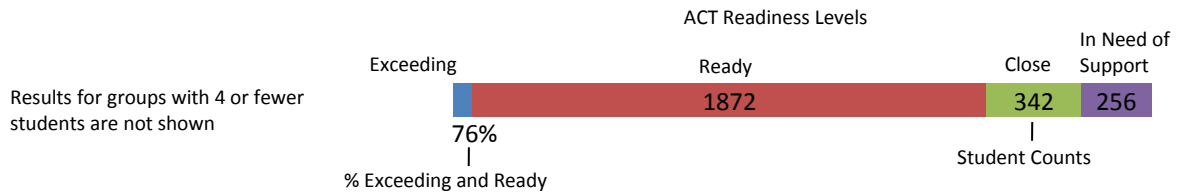
### WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

Westview Middle School enjoyed a highly successful 2014-2015 school year of student accomplishments as we celebrated yet another Palmetto Gold Award. WVM's Professional Learning Communities worked diligently to continue our tradition of excellence in academics and the fine arts. To maintain our focus on teaching and learning, our PLCs concentrated our efforts in the areas of assessment, differentiated instruction, Response to Intervention, school-wide Literacy, and Making Middle Schools Work practices. With an emphasis on informational text, teachers promoted reading and writing across the curriculum. Our weekly enrichment period allowed teachers to offer extra help during school with a focus on small group instruction and hands-on instruction. The Westview community and businesses supported our at risk students by mentoring during our Lunch Buddies and Lady Warriors and Gentlemen's programs. Westview's guidance department hosted parent information nights, Individual Graduation Plan (IGP) meetings, a Warrior Wisdom Advisory Program, and career exploration to assist students and parents in preparation for careers and higher education opportunities. PTO nights provided opportunities to showcase student work and inform parents of how state standards are implemented in our classrooms. We are most proud of our 224 eighth grade students who passed at least one of the five high school credit courses offered. Twenty-six eighth grade students qualified as Junior Scholars and 5 seventh grade students were recognized as Duke Tip Scholars. Westview students participated in the district Quiz Bowl, Regional Spelling Bee, Math Counts, First Lego qualifiers, and the Lowcountry Quest Competition. The Warrior Band received a superior rating at the South Carolina Concert Festival. We also had 8 All County Beginner Band members, 23 All County Band selectees, 13 regional band participants, and 5 All State band participants. The WVM Chorus had 16 students qualify for All County Chorus and 5 students recognized for All County Orchestra. WVM offered leadership opportunities through participation in National Jr. Beta Club, student council, and Project Unity. WVM takes great pride in the strength and diversity of our programs, the quality of teachers, the accomplishments of students, and the participation of our parents. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



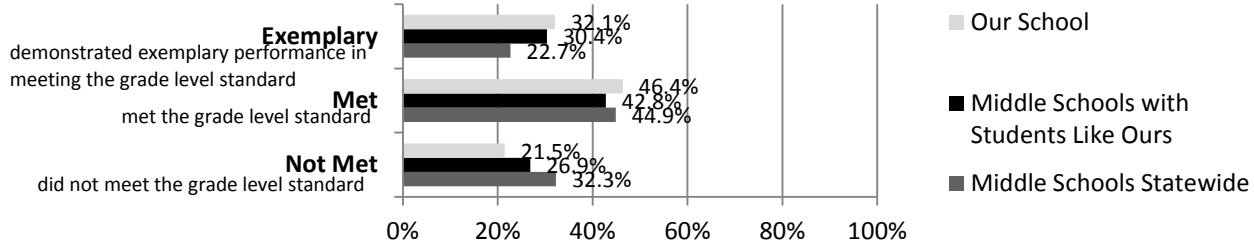

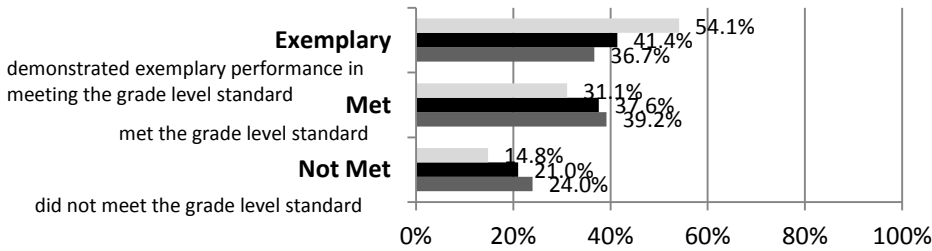
**KNOWLEDGE**
