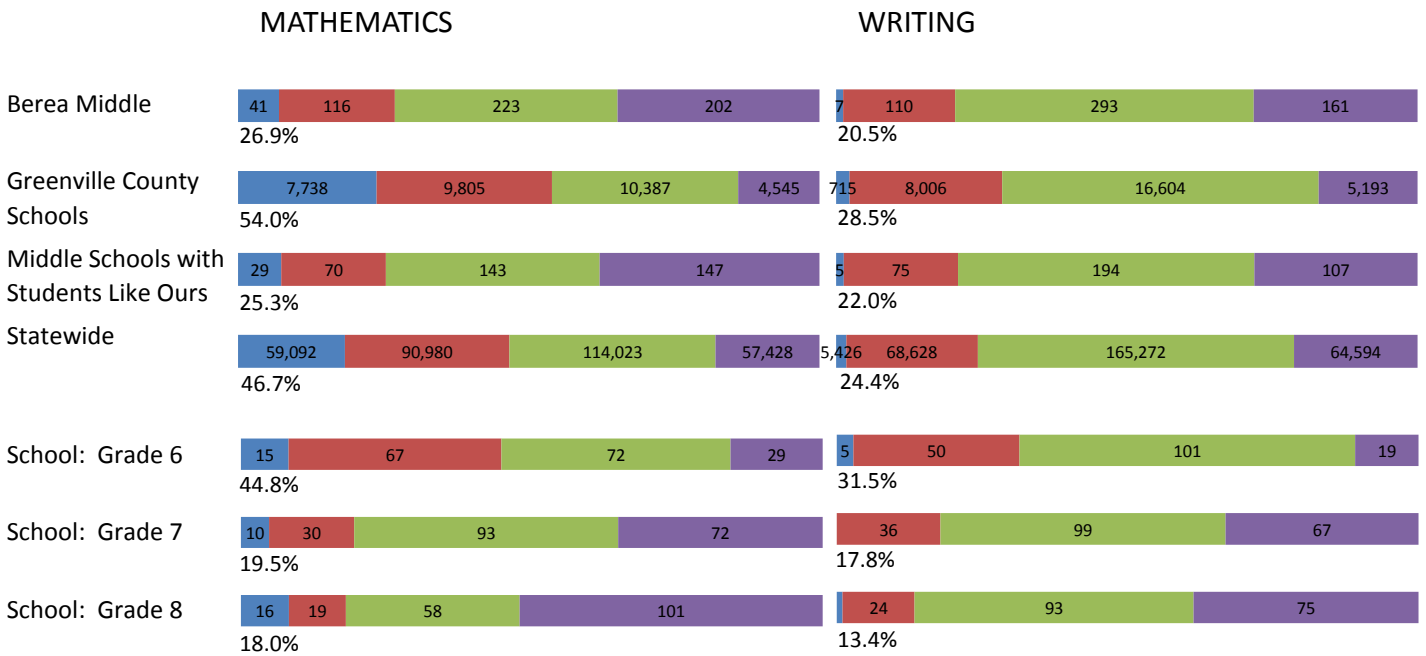
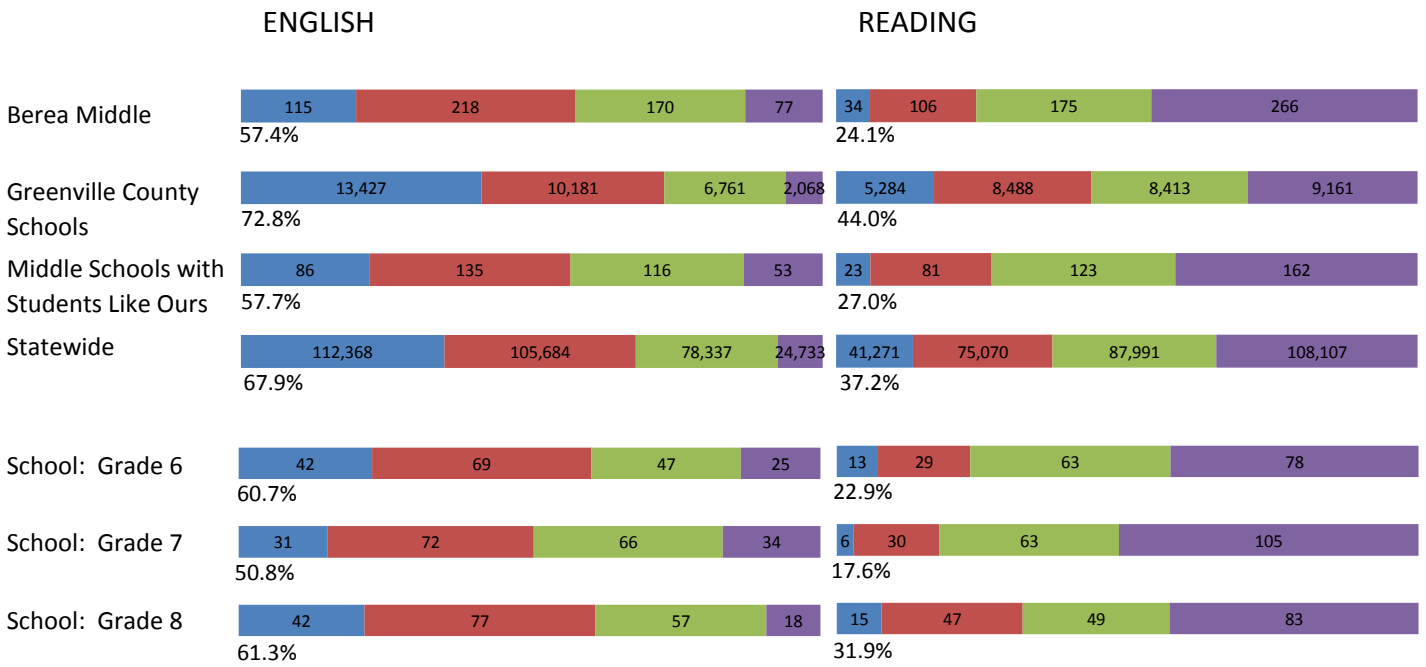

This year, Berea Middle School had state report card ratings of average for the absolute rating and average for the improvement rating, indicating that student achievement gains continue and our tagline Hard Work Pays Off are also evident. School-community partnerships continue to provide our students and teachers with much needed school supplies, bicycles for our Berea Spinners, and non-perishable food items for families in need. In a partnership with several different community organizations and businesses, the Berea Spinners Bike Club was continued. This partnership allows students who are loyal bike riders, (bicycles provided), to keep the mountain bikes provided. New riders are added each year. Adult mentors, teachers and community members, ride with the students regularly, and even during the summer. Furman University continued the university student lead, Ladies and Men of Distinction programs at the school. This mentoring program exposes middle school students to the importance and advantages that a college education offers. Furman University also continues to send university student tutors on a regular basis to enrich and augment student learning. Greenville Health System is another major community partner of Berea Middle School, providing food, and much needed school supplies. A weekend backpack program was started this year, in partnership with several churches, providing food for some of our neediest families. Professional development plays a fundamental role in our instructional process. Teachers are exposed to ongoing technology updates, workshops, and book studies, with focus on teacher-student relationships and implementation of state adopted standards, have, and will continue to be addressed. Professional development is designed according to identified teacher and instructional needs. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



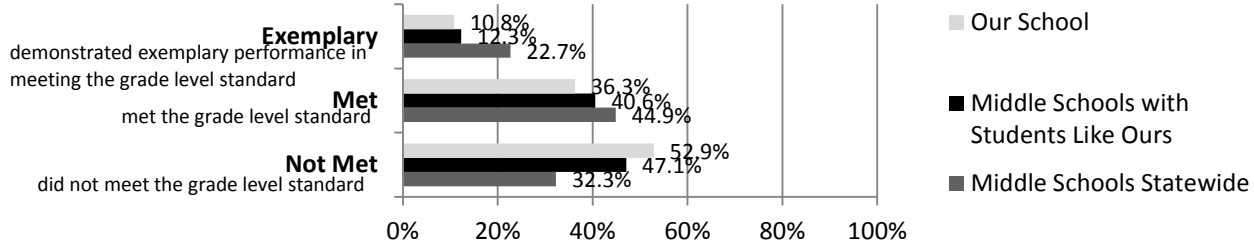

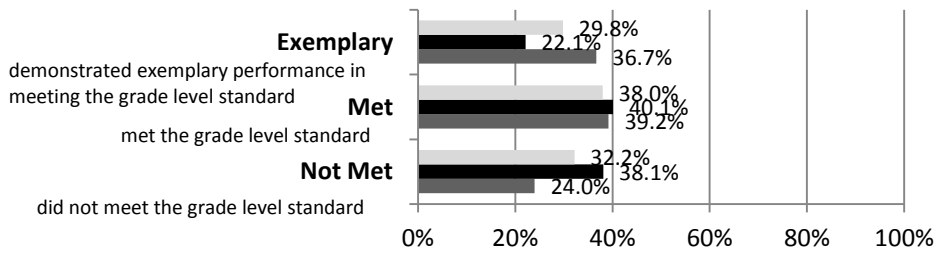
