Teachers at Gilbert Middle strive to implement best instructional practices in their classrooms. During the past school year, we implemented a blended-learning instructional model in all English language arts and mathematics classrooms. The model blends traditional whole group instruction with teacher-led small-group instruction, peer-to-peer collaboration and digital content to provide greater opportunities for the personalization of learning. Teacher training in the model continues, and we are excited about the opportunities for creativity, collaboration and application of the knowledge learned through this instructional model.

To foster a growth mindset and aid our students in their development as productive citizens, we paired each student with a certified staff member. Throughout the year, they met in seven small-group meetings called PowWow Time. Each meeting of the PowWow groups focused on one of Steven Covey's 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens. These 7 Habits encourage each student to develop his or her own leadership abilities.

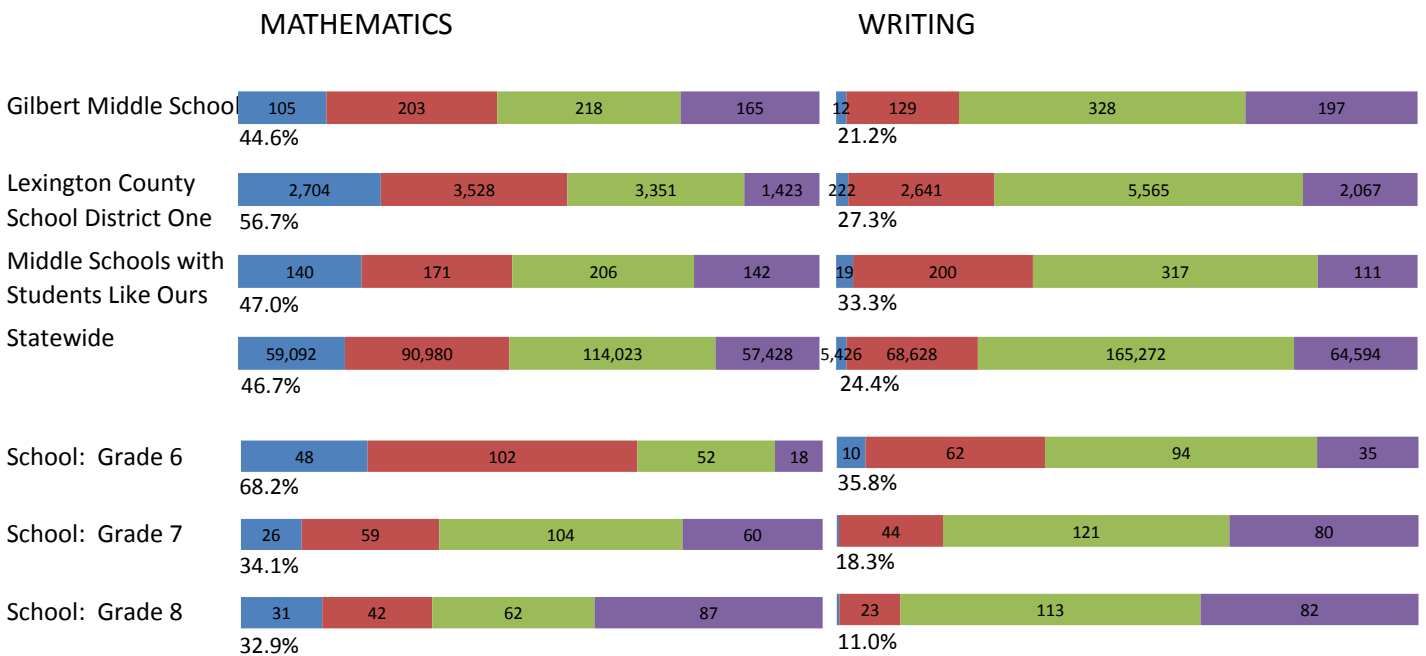

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



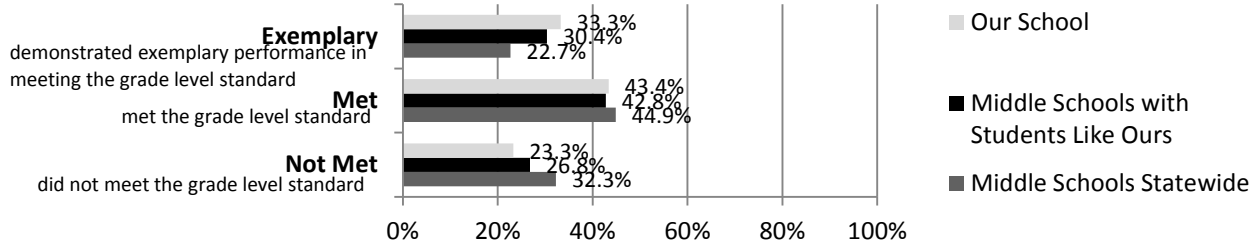

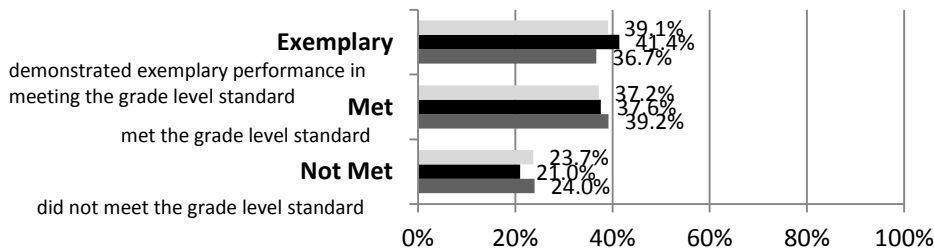
