William S. Hall School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by providing our students an opportunity to utilize Edgenuity to stay on track for graduation. This provides an opportunity for students to enroll in diploma track courses not offered at Hall School. Students in self-contained classes are also enrolled in functional math and ELA courses. William S. Hall is a residential facility located in downtown Columbia on the grounds of the SC Department of Mental Health that serves students requiring inpatient mental health services. Unless medically inadvisable, students are expected to participate in educational activities which will prepare them to meet South Carolina learning standards and score as well as their abilities allow on state standardized tests. Our academic program focuses on helping students stay current with their academic skills or develop strengths that will enable them to function more effectively in their regular school programs upon completion of their hospital stay. Each student is offered the opportunity to participate in the Richland One approved core course curriculum taught by certified teachers during his/her hospital stay. Because of the small number of students tested at our facility, our scores remain statistically insignificant; however, we have noted a steady increase in the number of students scoring Basic and Above Basic on HSAP and PASS. We have also experienced an increase in the number of students receiving passing scores on End of Course (EOC) examinations.

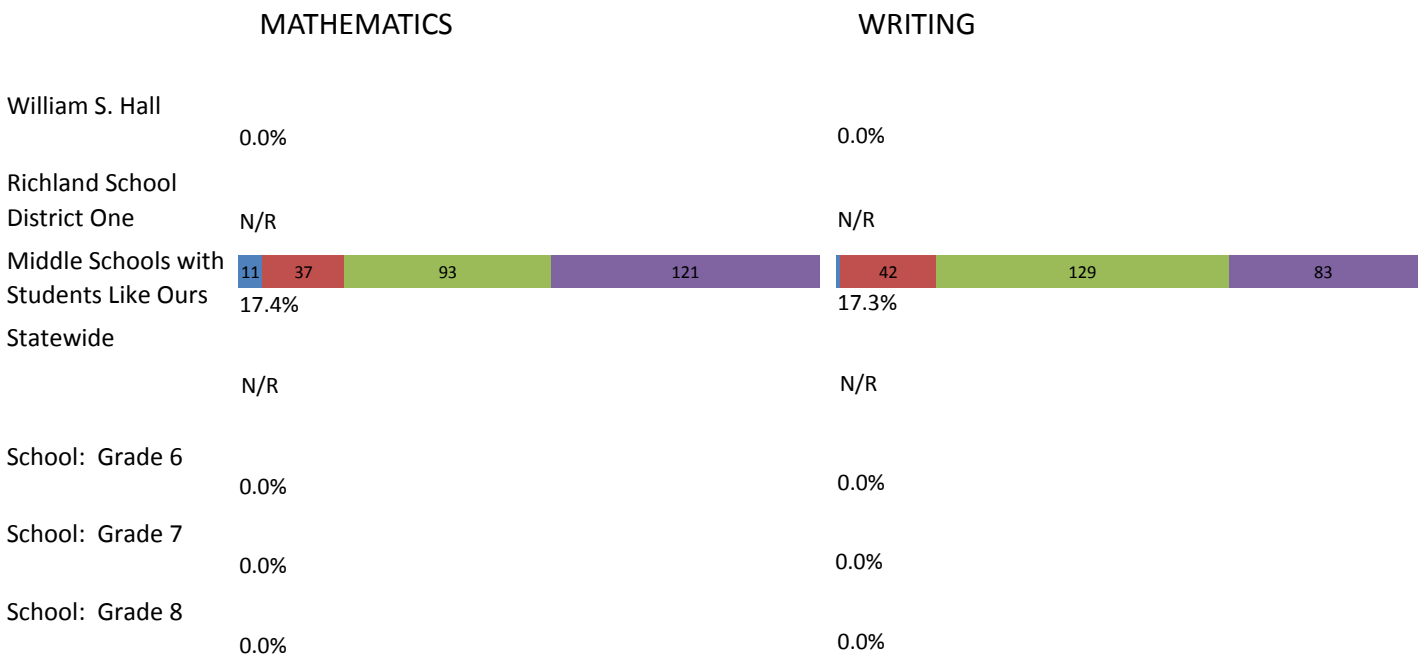
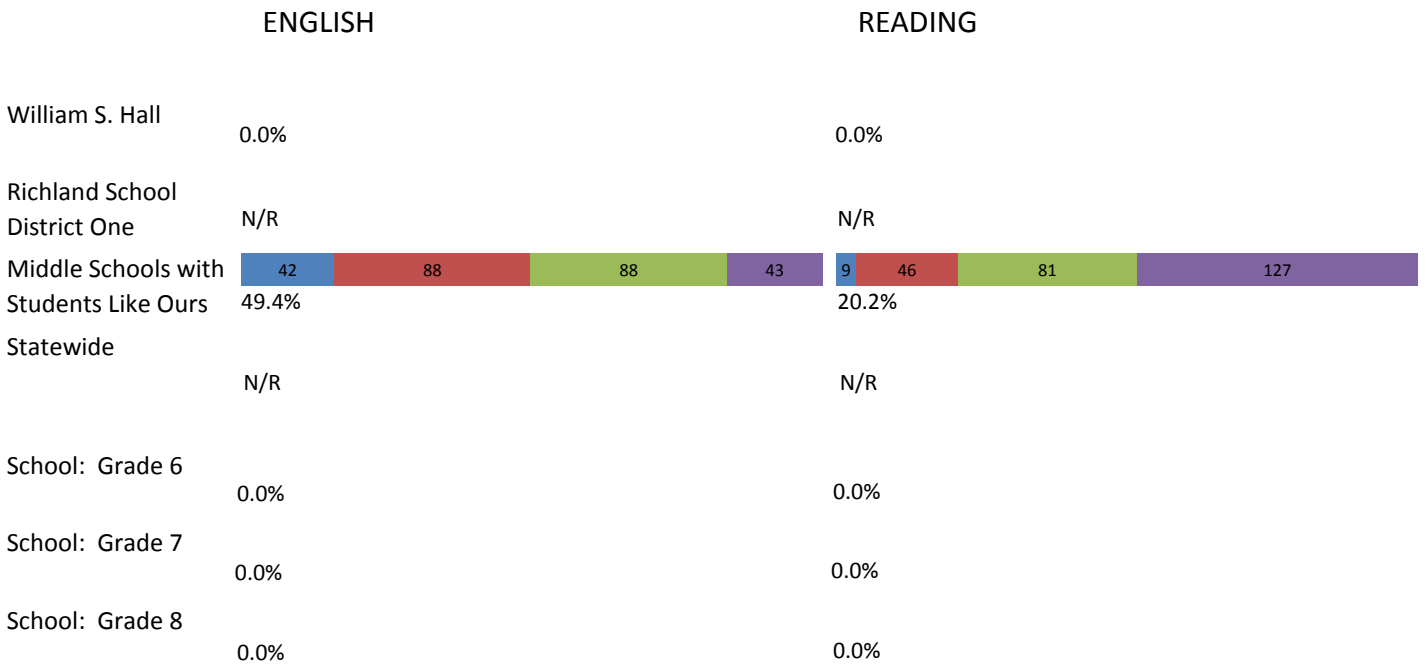
Staff participated in professional dialogue and implemented various teaching strategies on how to differentiate instruction in their classrooms. At the beginning of the year, teachers utilized data on past and current students to determine areas of strengths and weaknesses and developed strategies to focus on the areas that they determined as deficient. Staff was also involved in training on how to be proactive in preventing crises from occurring and how to intervene when a crisis occurs with students.

This year we have collaborated with the Department of Mental Health staff and they have been vital in providing input for the renewal and monitoring of our school renewal plan.

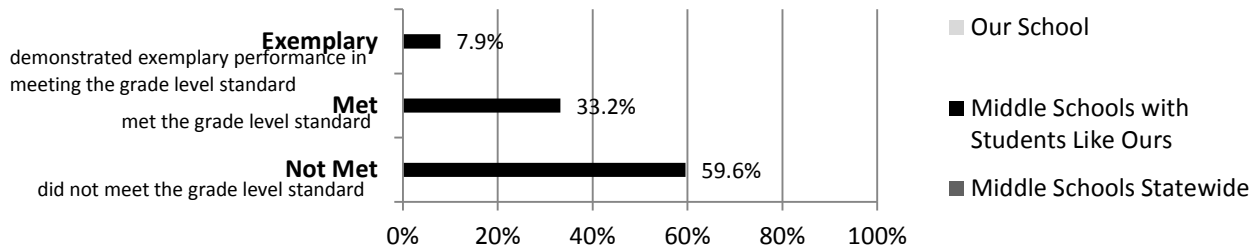

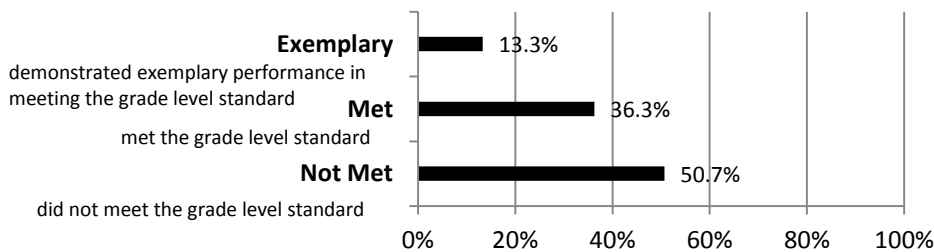
