During the 2014-15 school year, Blythewood Middle School maintained its focus on teaching and learning and working to ensure academic success for every child, every day. True to our mission statement: "To maximize student learning by providing engaging and meaningful opportunities in a rigorous environment where relationships are built, successes are celebrated, and students are competitive in the 21st Century." Blythewood Middle School equipped its afterschool tutorial program with wraparound clubs designed to further capture students' interest in the afterschool tutorial program, create greater opportunities for teacher-student relationships, and provide more meaningful learning experiences beyond the traditional classroom environment.

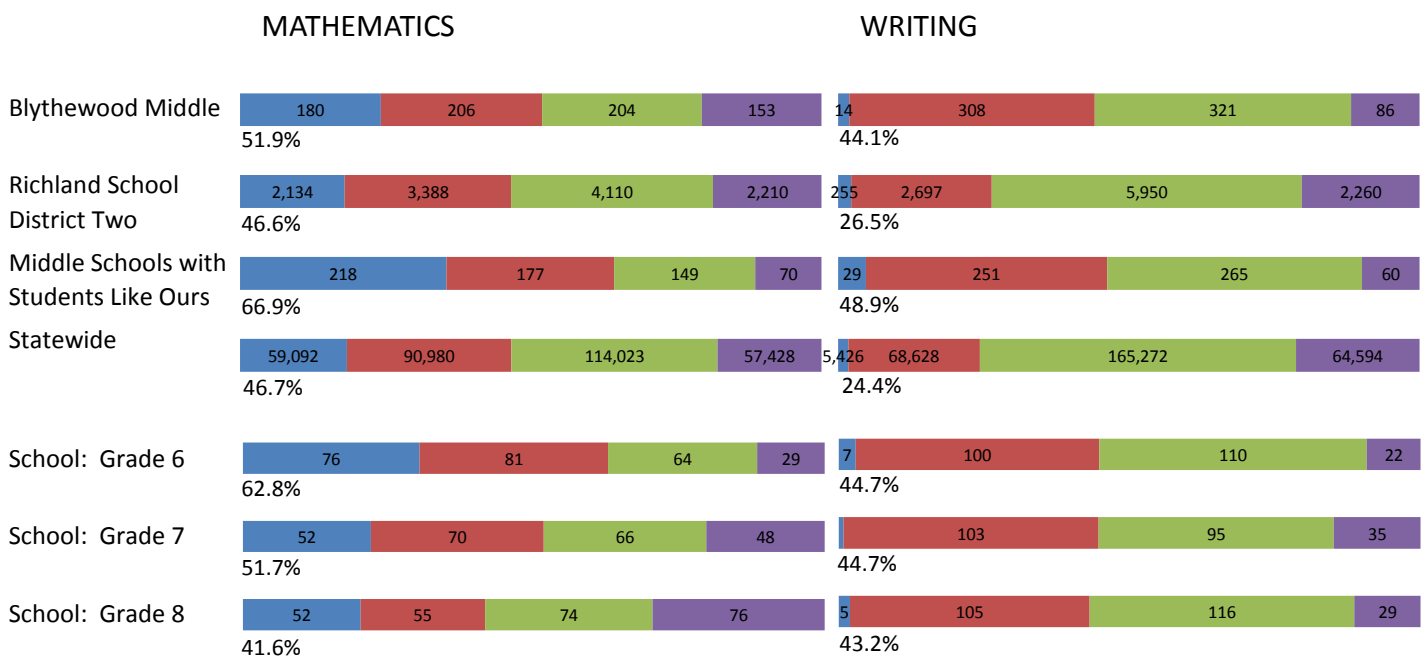
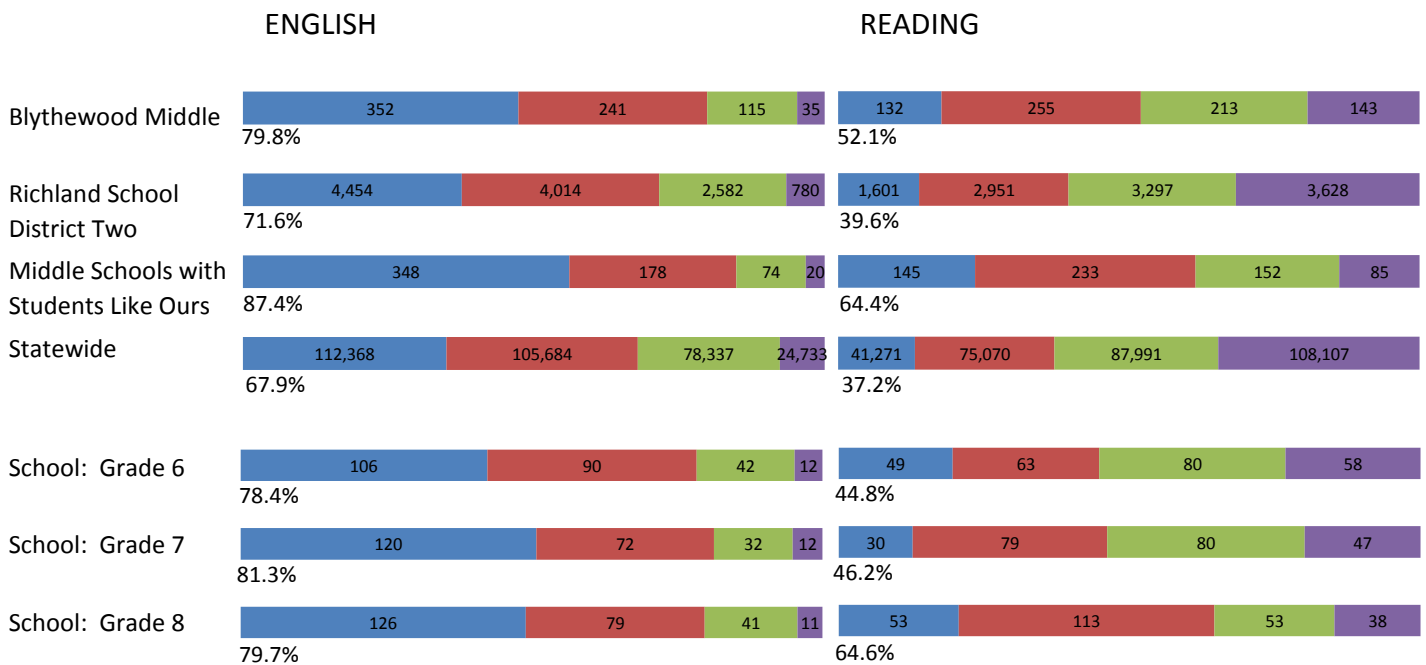
To aid teachers in constantly looking at student data, the school implemented a data room used to make informed decisions regarding instructional practices. Teachers were able to use the data room as a means for gathering information on one student, groups of students, or grouping students into differentiated learning groups. Utilizing data from MAP, classroom assessments and previous PASS scores, teachers focused on developing students' areas of weakness and customizing instruction specific to the individual student. As faculty members realized the value of the school's data room, a collaborative decision was made to begin implementing data cards for all students beginning in the 2015-16 school year.

As Blythewood Middle School continues to help all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate, the school has committed to Project Based Learning as a best practice for teaching and learning. The school is currently providing teachers with additional professional development through the Buck Institute for Education such that teachers can successfully teach students the essential project design elements of Project Based Learning.

In addition to our commitment to Project Based Learning, Blythewood Middle School is committed to the key practices of Making Middle Grades Work and continues to look for ways to help students meet with success at the middle school level. Our increased focus on AVID strategies within the classroom helps our students continue to develop organizational skills essential to their middle school years, as well as schooling beyond. Middle School's newly implemented Honor Roll Parade introduced as a means for celebrating student academic achievement. Our PTO and SIC continued to be an integral part of the school, particularly in our efforts to create an academic mentoring program which will partner with our feeder elementary and high school(s) and the update and beautification of BMS as we embark upon 20 years of teaching and learning during the 2015-2016 school year.

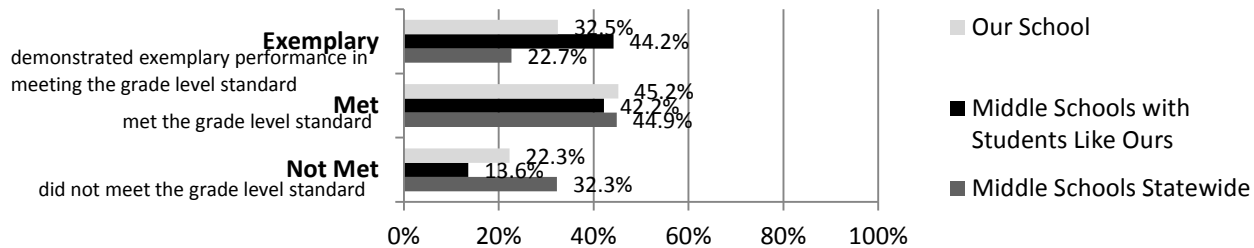
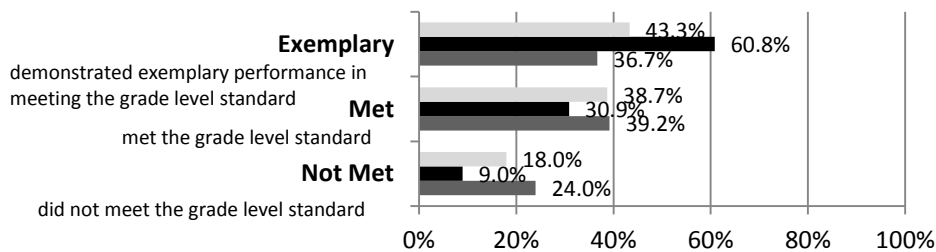
