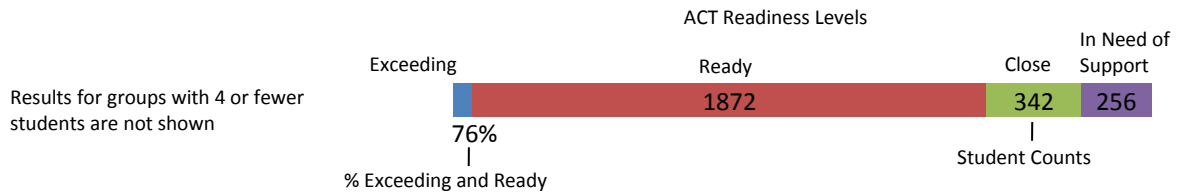
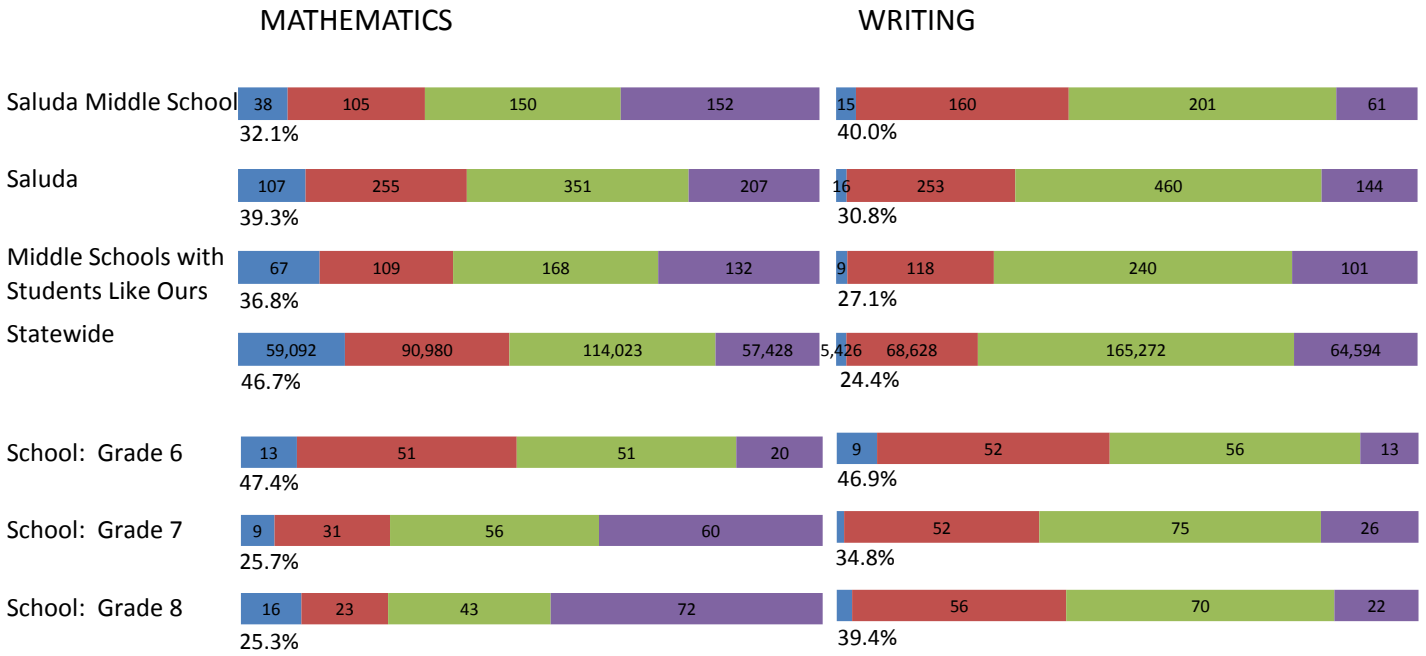
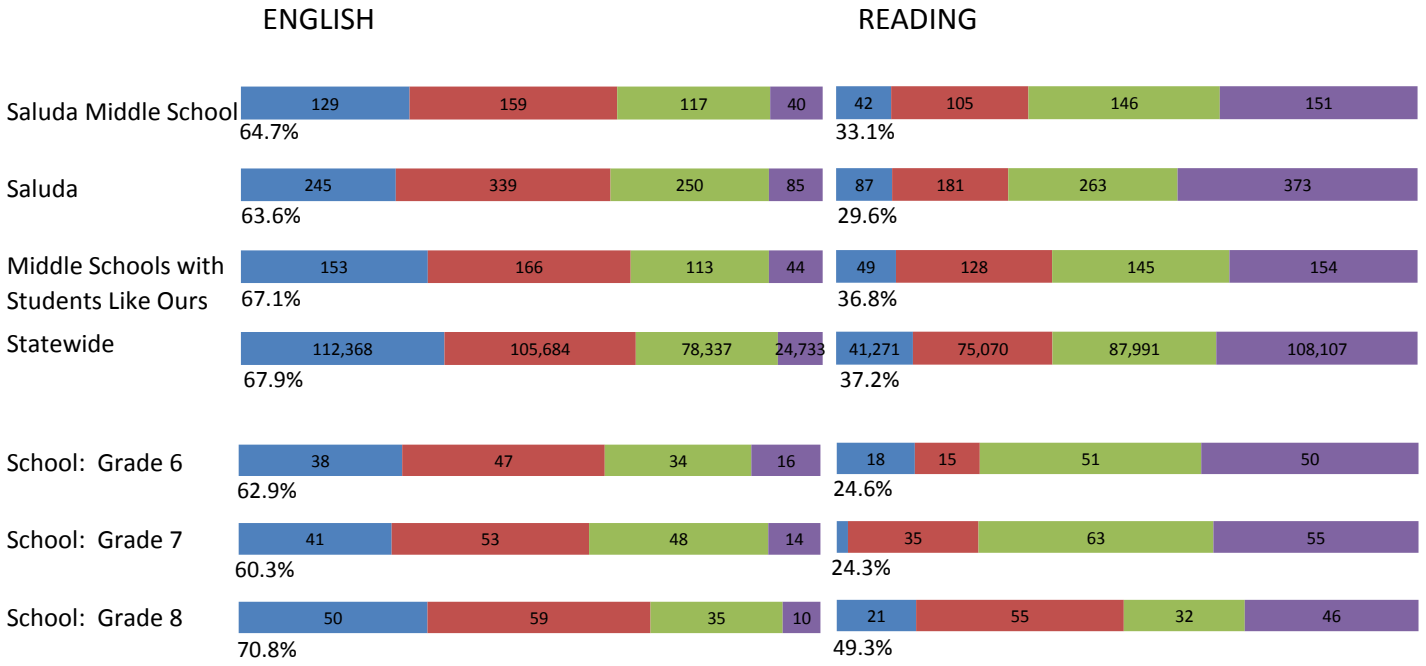
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by providing a safe, academically challenging and supportive learning environment for every student. We provide such an environment through the implementation of our school vision: a school that is "Recognizing and Maximizing Potential." We demonstrate this vision by challenging our students with a rigorous and relevant curriculum and by the continuous professional development of our teachers.

Our teachers are always seeking to learn and implement new and effective strategies to motivate and engage students. Teachers have participated in professional learning opportunities throughout the school year to increase student performance in all subject areas such as: IQMS Disciplinary Literacy Project, Systemic Assessment course, Ruth Patrick Science STEM Education Math series, PLTW Gateway to Technology, and TAP: The System for Teacher and Student Advancement. The leadership team participated in Cognitive Coaching training to better provide supports to teachers as they implement new learning. At Saluda Middle School we also have various programs beyond academics to focus on the development of the whole child. We began the 2014-15 school year by reading the novel *Schooled* in all grade levels, supporting our OLWEUS bullying prevention program. We believe that it is imperative that all students feel welcome and safe in all areas of our school. This year we continued to use the Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program to support a school culture where preparing for success, acting responsibly, working cooperatively, and showing respect are school-wide expectations. This program allowed for students to receive weekly incentives, quarterly celebrations, and an end of the year incentive trip. We also continued our partnership with Saluda County Behavioral Health to provide individualized counseling and services to students and their families. Our Boy's Club and Girls' Club are faith-based after school clubs that mentor and nurture the social and emotional growth of our students while teaching valuable Life and Career Characteristics such as integrity, self-direction, perseverance, work ethic, and interpersonal skills. Our Jr. Beta Club focused on service and leadership through various projects on campus as well in the community such as a food drive, Christmas caroling at Saluda Nursing Center, Adopt a Highway, Palmetto Children's Hospital Teen Gift drive, and competing at the state and national Jr. Beta Club conventions.

Using Title I funds, we were able to give our students access to more technology and introduce STEM-based courses to our course offerings to better equip them with the World Class Skills needed in the future. At Saluda Middle School we believe the school, family, and community must share the responsibility to educate our children. Thank you for all of your support in helping in the development of our future graduates and leaders.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



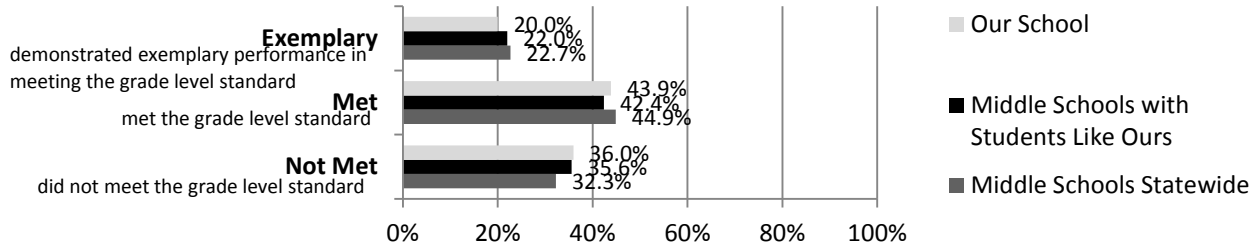

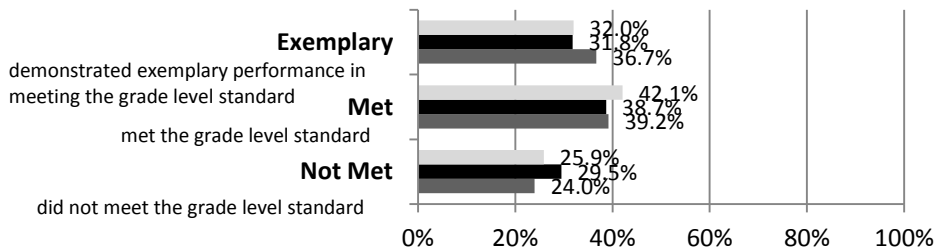
