Manning Early Childhood Center is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the SC Graduate by providing the opportunity for every child to experience academic and social success in a safe, nurturing, and developmentally appropriate environment. The mission, "educating children" is exemplified in rigorous standards for reading and math and world-class enterprise learning and training for teachers. MECC incorporates a variety of programs to promote creativity, innovation, collaboration, and community. A STEM lab provides students with multiple subject activities utilizing the Cubelets Robotics Program. Students have one to one I-Pad devices and all classrooms have interactive boards, MAC Books, and multiple computers. Students have an opportunity to collaborate and problem solve individually and in groups that support life and career characteristics. Students are also exposed to world-class skills and life and career characteristics through a district and community-wide Character Education Program, Career Day, Digital Citizenship Education, and an Advocacy Program-Making Every Child Count. Students and the staff participate in multiple Service Learning Projects such as Relay for Life and Soles 4 Souls. MECC strives to provide all the skills to prepare students to be a successful graduate by beginning with the end in mind and providing the school choice programs-Montessori, full-day Pre-K, and a Developmentally Delayed preschool program for disabled students beginning at age three. Opportunities for parents provide extra support for students through a community supported Literacy Night, a Family Resource Center with two parent educators, and a Raising a Reader take home reading project. MECC students received a summer reading library for the past three years. MECC teachers exemplify world-class knowledge and skills. The school has six National Board Certified Teachers and over 75% have advanced degrees. Teachers participate in an extensive professional development program including Summer Academy, Project Based Learning, and technology training.
